Hong Kong, Friday, 26 October 2007 - The Directors of Designing Hong Kong opened the exhibition of four models for the Central Waterfront today.

The models were prepared by the four finalists in the HK\$1million Central Waterfront Design Competition. The opening today was officiated by the Directors of Designing Hong Kong, Christine Loh, Markus Shaw, Peter Wong and Paul Zimmerman, the organizers of the competition.

Summary details of the four finalists

501 “Amphibian Carpet” by Selah Au, Hins Cheung, Bart Chui, Lewis Chui, proposes human activities and natural habitat can coexist within the city. The scheme contains a vegetated carpet stretching into the city and connecting to the harbor front. Above the carpet is public open space, below is developable area. The harbor front is restored to a natural wetland park for environmental conservation and educational purposes. This proposal hopes to explore the balance point between urbanization and natural environment.

502 "Hong Kong Waterfront" by HEY!arch, Chris Hillyard (Scotland, Cambridge University, Princeton University) and Edward Yung (Canada, Columbia University, Princeton University) and Kipp Edick (USA, Columbia University), are proposing an urban structure which re-connects the waterfront to the city. The design re-establishes a physical connection between Hong Kong Peak and the waterfront with a new landscape weaving through the Central Business district down to the water. The vibrant waterfront itself is comprised by a series of urban plazas, commercial and public functions woven into this new park landscape.

503 Central Harbourfront Promenade – “Emerald Necklace” is a joint submission by RTKL International Ltd. in Shanghai and Urban Design & Planning Consultants Limited in Hong Kong Team - Gregory Yager, Chinyao Chen, Sujata Govada with Dick Groves of RDC • Retail Development Consultants, Chin Kim Meng of CKM Asia Limited (Traffic Advisor), Jason Kim, Bethy Zhang, Suvarna Apte, Kan Cheng, Elizabeth Lo, Yasmine Huang, Jarey Lu, Jenny Han, Jun Do, Ian Mak and Salina Mou. Central Harbourfront Promenade – envisions an "Emerald Necklace" that stretches from the Central Ferry Piers to the HKCEC linking four activity nodes: Gateway and Transport Cluster – Central Harbour Place; Heritage and Culture Cluster – Inner Harbour Esplanade; Government and Civic Cluster – Tamar Civic Plaza; Arts and Events Cluster – Eco-landscaped Marina Park. Each node incorporates several jewels such as the restored Star Ferry Clock Tower, Queen’s Pier, the Statue Square Esplanade and the Harbour Heritage Centre. The Emerald Necklace is a low density mixed use urban quarter featuring with well-distributed green spaces. The waterfront is connected to a network of multi level pedestrian linkages providing both east-west and north-south accessibility from the hinterland. Rail, tram and water transport and the Harbour Boulevard further improve the pedestrian experience and accessibility to and from the harbourfront. The waterfront promenade provides for 24/7 land and marine based leisure and recreational activities for the public to enjoy.

504 “Sky for Dragon, Earth for People” by Jack Sidener, Hawaii, and former professor at the Chinese University of Hong Kong, proposes that the majority of the site be developed as a low-rise urban district oriented to street life, with mixed-uses including residential. A continuous human scale open space lines the waterfront to allow more interaction with Victoria Harbour.

Background of the Designing Hong Kong and the Central Waterfront Design Competition

The Central Waterfront competition seeks creativity to assist the government define the character and identity of the front door to Asia's World City. Competition submissions are expected to be innovative, yet practical and feasible, and are expected to challenge the existing land use and transport plans for the Central Waterfront. The site area for the competition runs from the Four Season's Hotel to the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre. The competition supports the Central Reclamation Urban Design Study which is undertaken by the Planning Department of the Hong Kong Government. All designs will be submitted to the Government, the Town Planning Board, the Legislative Council, the Harbour-front Enhancement Committee and the community at large.

Four finalists have been selected from 82 entries by the jury and advisors:

The fund for prize money is HK\$1,000,000 and is donated by The Society for Protection of the Harbour.
